David Burliuk was a painter, poet and the energetic organizer of Futurism. He was born in 1882 near Kharkiv area in eastern Ukraine. His father managed the largest estate with horse in the Kherson area, called Hylaea by the ancient Greeks.. He studied in Odesa, Kazan, Munich and Paris. Burliuk's early paintings show Fauvist and Cubist influences, as well as a fascination with Scythian culture. He took part in many excavations of the Scythian burial mounds that dot the Kherson area where he spent his formative years. He founded the artistic group Hylaea. Burliuk's favorite character was Mamai, who embodied for him a vision of self-sufficiency. Burliuk was an active participant in important avant-garde exhibitions in Kyiv, Moscow, St. Petersburg and Munich. With the Futurists, Burliuk toured 17 cities. They drew packed houses, scandalizing some, but also winning converts. During the revolutionary years, he traveled to Siberia, giving Futurist performances. From 1920 to 1922 he spent time in Japan. In 1922, Burliuk arrived in New York. He died in Long Island in 1967.

BOB HOLMAN is a poet most often connected with the oral tradition, spoken word, poetry slams and digital poetry. His most recent books include: India Journals, to accompany the film he wrote and hosts, Ginsberg's Karma; and Life Poem and The Unspoken, two books of poetry written 50 years apart. As an actor, he originated and toured in Stories Left to Tell: Spalding Gray and created the part of Captain John Smith in Yara's Capt. John Smith Goes to Ukraine. He also performed in 1917-2017: Tychyna Zhadan & the Dogs at La MaMa and "Radio477!" He created two awardwinning PBS series, The United States of Poetry, and the documentary on endangered languages, Language www.bobholman.com

SUSAN HWANG tells stories and makes collapsible things like songs and times. She plays accordion, janggu (Korean drum) and piano, but physical objects she can't play, wear or eat intimidate her. She's the founder/producer of international, literatureinspired arts non-profit, The Bushwick Book Club. Not a great vacationer, she leaves NYC for theater and with bands like The Debutante Hour, Lusterlit and Soozee Hwang and The Relastics. You can read her first illustrated story in "Coinky Dink" a zine produced by artist Yoko Oji Kikuchi. JULIAN KYTASTY is a third -generation bandura player. He is both a keeper of traditions and an innovator who has opened new paths for his instrument. He has worked frequently with Yara Arts Group creating and performing music for theatre pieces, poetry performances, and festivals. His work on Yara's 1917-2017 Tychyna, Zhadan, and the Dogs earned him a NY Innovative Theater award for best original score. He continues to teach bandura to a new generation of students in North America and Ukraine, to record, to compose and arrange music for bandura, and to engage in collaborative projects.

VIRLANA TKACZ (director) heads the Yara Arts Group and has directed 40 original shows at La MaMa Theatre in New York, as well as in Kyiv, Lviv, Kharkiv, Bishkek, Ulaanbaatar, and Ulan Ude. Favorite productions include Capt John Smith Goes to Ukraine, Dark Night Bright Stars, 1917-2017 Tychyna, Zhadan, and the Dogs and Radio 477! She received an NEA Poetry Translation Fellowship for her translations with Wanda Phipps of Serhiy Zhadan's poetry, the second volume of which was published by Yale University Press as *How Fire Descends* (2023).

WATOKU UENO (set & lights) began his journey at La MaMa ETC, where he discovered his passion for avant-garde theatre. His creative adventures have taken him from Ukraine to Kyrgyzstan and Siberia, forming deep collaborations with local artists. Known for his poetic shadow puppet shows, often exploring the theme of trees, Ueno's artistry earned him grants from the Jim Henson Foundation for Tall Keyaki Tree and the Bronx Council on the Arts for Silent Green. With two American Theatre Wing nominations and an NEA/TCG Fellowship, As a founding member of the Yara Arts Group, a resident company at La MaMa, Ueno continues to contribute significantly to the vibrant world of theatre. www.watokuueno.com
